# Ambulance tests watched by over 200

An outbreak of hooliganism in which a man was attacked with a spanner, brought over 30 first-aid workers into action at King's Lynn yesterday. But it was not a real life incident, although the wounds of the "blood-splashed casualties" looked authentic enough.

The first-aid workers, watched by over 200 people, were taking part in the King's Lynn Borough Ambulance Cup and Novices' Ambulance Cup com-

petitions, both of which were held at St. James Boys' School. The entry of six teams of four men for the Borough Ambulance Cup is believed to be the highest since its inception in 1904.

The winners of the Borough Ambulance Cup, a three-foot high silver trophy, were the St. John Ambulance Brigade team, who also won the contest last year when it was revived after an eight-year break. The British Red Cross Society Cadets were narrow victors in the junior section.

Dr. P. F. R. Lankester, chairman of the competition, remarked that if there

were as many entries in future years, the contests would have to be run separately.

was Dr. Ivor Davies, superintendent at Kelling Hospital, and the oral tests were conducted by Dr. R. E. Crockatt, of Sutton Bridge. Dr. Davies said the first aid standard was good all round. The spirit of the competition was good, he added, and he hoped it would be maintained.

Presenting the trophies and mementoes, the Mayor of Lynn, Mr. E. A. Anderson, who was accompanied by the Mayoress, said he was pleased
